Colin Narbeth, a banknote specialist writing for the Conchological Society of Great Britain and Ireland, notes that cowry shells were used as currency in Africa and Asia as early as 2,000 B.C. According to Narbeth, Chinese legal documents record that a Shang Dynasty ruler rebuked his ministers for coveting cowries and jade.





Not only shells themselves, but also beads made from shells served as currency, especially in North America. The earliest shell beads, which were found in North Africa and Israel, date back approximately 100,000 years, according to Richard Conniff in "Smithsonian" magazine.

American Indians of the Northeast wove elaborate bands of shell beads, known as wampum, a Narragansett term meaning "white shell beads." Europeans sometimes mistook these beauties for bone or even porcelain. Sometimes the ancients valued seashells shell ornament found near primarily for their beauty. For example, in an

article in "American Archaeology" magazine, Elaine Robbins describes the study of a Mississippian culture site in Oklahoma, where archaeologists have found shells and artifacts made from shells inscribed with elaborate carvings.

Readers of The Da Vinci Code, by Dan Brown, will recognize the name Fibonacci Numbers. In his book, Dan Brown uses this sequence as part of the clues left behind by Jacques Sauniere, Sauniere raised his granddaughter,


the murdered curator. coaching her in endless puzzles. As an adult she became a



cryptographer. When presented with the numbers in a scrambled form, she recognizes the sequence, and understands that it is part of a message.

In reality, the Fibonacci Sequence is the series of numbers: 1, 1, 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 21, and 34. Called the "greatest European mathematician of the middle ages", Leonardo Fibonacci was born in Pisa, Italy about 1175 A.D. he is

credited for changing Europe from the abacus method of counting to the decimal system based on the Hindu-Arabic number system. He calculated the symmetry of the seashell, calling it the Golden Spiral and recognizing it as a mathematical tiling. When drawn on paper, this tiling created a series of circular arcs connecting the opposite Fibonacci sequence overlaid on a




nautilus shell.

corners of squares in the Fibonacci number sequence tiling Botanists know that stems, leafs and petals of a spiral design conform to this formula. Some astronomers are even seeing a relationship in the shape of the galaxies as described by the Fibonacci numbers.

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

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
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FIELD TRIPS By Joe Goetz



Field Trip – Palos Verdes July 20th

This will be a day trip to the Palos Verde Searchers Gem

and Mineral Society. Our field trip leader will be Chris Kyte and he will meet club members at the site at noon.

Joe Goetz Field Trip Chairman

We will start on the Hermosa Beach side of the peninsula where we will find barite and agate; then work our way around the peninsula toward Long Beach, stopping at an old dolomite quarry (wear long pants for brush if you opt to continue to this location), and - if you have any energy after that over to Point Fermin for the elusive Glaucophane. We'll head to the beach after the briefing at 1:00 pm, taking advantage of a 1:32 on low tide.

Directions: Take San Diego Freeway (405) and exit at the Hawthorne Blvd. off ramp. Turn left on Hawthorne Blvd. and go 5.5 miles to Pacific Coast Highway. Turn right and continue 2.1 miles to Palos Verdes Blvd., turn left and proceed 1.5 miles to stop sign at main intersection of Malaga Cove Plaza. Turn right onto Via Almar and continue .4 mile, then right again onto Via Arroyo for .1 mile, then left onto Paseo Del Mar. Head uphill .6 mile to parking area on right. From here there is a trail down to the beach.

Clothing: At beach shorts are good, but bring a sturdy pair of shoes or boots - it's very rocky and walking is required. Also, sun screen, basic first aid and a hat.

I found Barite ! Equipment: Rock pick or a collapsible shovel. Something to

carry rocks in (bucket, knap sack or wheeled carrier for rocks) Bring water and snacks! The trail up the cliffs is wide and not level and can be trying on a hot afternoon.
